Charges Dropped Against 'Tax-Funding Abortions' Protester

Charges Dropped Against New Brunswick Pro-Life Hero David Little



FREDERICTON -- The latest charge against an anti-abortion crusader in New Brunswick, who refuses to file income tax returns, has been dropped. David Little was charged in Fredericton in April with failing to comply with a judge's order to file his returns for 2000, 2001 and 2002. Little was convicted in 2007 for failing to file the returns, and was sentenced to 66 days in jail earlier this year after the Supreme Court of Canada refused to hear his appeal. The 66-year-old Roman Catholic, who is married and has eight children, has vowed to never file another tax return as long as there is tax-funded abortion in Canada. Prior to sentencing in April, Little said the federal government was using tax revenue to pay "gynecological assassins." The Attorney General of Canada ordered Revenue Canada to stay all proceedings against Little in a surprise victory on August 10 when he was to attend another hearing in Fredericton.
